





### **Preface**

The pages that follow chronicle a transformative year for Davao Oriental State University (DOrSU). In 2024 we advanced boldly along our three strategic pillars—Higher Education, Research & Extension, and Administrative Stewardship—and the results attest to the collective resolve of our academic community. Higher Education — Every accreditable program now bears AACCUP recognition, most at Levels II or III, and our first-time licensure examinees surpassed national passing rates in teaching, nursing, and criminology—by as much as 139.6 % in the Elementary LET. Even with residual pandemic headwinds, we conferred degrees on 1,434 graduates and grew enrolment to 17,257, officially designating DOrSU a medium-sized university. Crucially, 14,452 students benefited from scholarships and grants—proof that geographical or economic barriers need not limit ambition in Davao Oriental. Research & Extension — Scholarship translated into service. Faculty and students published in refereed journals, presented at 28 scholarly fora, and exceeded our annual target for research uptake by 20 %. Extension initiatives drew participation at 431 % of goal, delivering livelihood training and resilience projects that ripple through every municipality we serve. **Administrative Stewardship** — Behind these successes lies a stronger institutional backbone. On 23 May 2024 the Board approved a re-organized structure that introduced a fourth vice-presidency dedicated to planning, quality assurance, and global affairs. Streamlined Internal Control, Budget, and Cashiering units safeguarded resources that funded priority capital works and student-centric services. These milestones were made possible by a committed corps of full-time and part-time faculty, dedicated staff, many of whom hold advanced degrees, and by a future-ready workforce whose energy drives innovation across our campuses.

Looking ahead to 2025, we commit to:

- 1. Scale digital and micro-credential offerings that broaden access and upskill lifelong learners.
- 2. Accelerate multidisciplinary research clusters focused on climate resilience and agri-technology.
- 3. Execute Phase 2 of our modernization roadmap, embedding data-driven governance and student-centric service delivery.

To our faculty, staff, students, alumni, partners, and friends: this report is as much your story as it is ours. Thank you for shaping an inclusive, innovative, and excellent DOrSU. May these accomplishments inspire even greater collaborations in the year ahead.

# Davao Oriental State University Annual Accomplishment Report 2024

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## THE DAVAO ORIENTAL STATE UNIVERSITY (DOrSU)

### **BRIEF HISTORY**

The Davao Oriental State University (DOrSU) was established in response to the need for quality tertiary education in the province of Davao Oriental. Its inception can be traced back to 1972, when Hon. Thelma Z. Almario, then Mayor of the Municipality of Mati, founded the Mati Community College (MCC) per resolution number 22, series of 1972. The College was a local government-run community college located in Barangay Sainz. It offered liberal arts and business-oriented programs. Dr. Leopoldo Bravo, an administrator of the Department of Education, Culture, and Sports, assumed concurrent leadership of the College.

With the goal to expand its operation and provide more opportunities to the residents of Davao Oriental and its neighboring provinces, MCC was converted into Davao Oriental State College of Science and Technology (DOSCST), established on December 13, 1989, by virtue of Republic Act No. 6807. The said conversion was proactively advanced by Hon. Thelma Z. Almario during her tenure as the 2nd Congressional District Representative of Davao Oriental. This newly chartered College started operations in June 1990 with the appointment of Dr. Julieta I. Ortiz on May 20, 1990, as its founding president.

In September 1991, the College relocated to a ten-hectare flat land in Barangay Dahican, generously donated by the Mindanao Agro-Pioneers Corporation, owned by the heirs of the late Don Jose Corro Martinez, Sr.

Dr. Jonathan A. Bayogan was appointed as the second college president and served two terms from June 1997 until June 2003. Througout his tenure, extension campuses were established in the adjacent town of San Isidro in November 1997 and in the second northern-most town of Cateel in June 1999. This strategic initiative aims to overcome geographical barriers and ensure equitable opportunities for all to pursue tertiary education.

Dr. Grace G. Lopez succeeded Dr. Bayogan as president. Her term of office started on June 28, 2007, and concluded on June 27, 2011. Throughout her tenure, several significant milestones were achieved, including the installation of a Management Advisory Council in Cateel and San Isidro Extension Campuses, the establishment of an Internal Control Unit to oversee transactions involving government funds, the initiation of administrative policy reforms, and the development of infrastructure to enhance services for students and the community. The College also experienced growth with an increasing rate of student enrollees due to the offering of new academic programs.

Dr. Edito B. Sumile served as the fourth president of the College for two terms starting from February 16, 2012, until January 15, 2020. Under his leadership, an extension campus was established in the Municipality of Banaybanay in June 2015. The physical landscape of the College experienced substantial development with the establishment of numerous buildings and infrastructures across its campuses. In his second term, the College was converted into Davao Oriental State University (DOrSU).

The Davao Oriental State University (DOrSU) was established through Republic Act No. 11033, signed into law by President Rodrigo Roa Duterte at the Malacañang Palace on May 28, 2018. Its conversion is an end-product of House Bill 7007 authored by Congress Representative Joel Mayo Z. Almario and Senate Bill 1617 filed by Senator Joel E. Villanueva.

President Emeritus Edito B. Sumile successfully paved the groundwork for the University conversion and was sustained by his successor, Dr. Roy G. Ponce.

Dr. Roy G. Ponce was elected as the fifth president of DOSCST on February 19, 2021. It was during his term that the College was officially declared by CHED to be fully compliant with the requirements to operate as a state university. On May 28, 2021, DOSCST was officially declared as a full-fledged university.

With the conversion, the University envisions continually taking part in nation-building by offering advanced technological instruction and pursuing cutting-edge research, extension, and production programs in various fields of science and technology. It played a valuable role in producing professionals and experts who contributed to the advancement of the Davao Region and beyond. Its charter mandates offering of undergraduate, graduate, and postgraduate programs in agriculture and environmental studies, pure and applied sciences, behavioral and social sciences, law, culture and arts, tourism, business, nautical science and maritime transportation, industrial technology, engineering, education and teacher training, communication and information technology, health sciences, developmental management and leadership, and other areas of specialization.

### The Campus Map

### **DOrSU's Organizational Structure**

The key high lights include the addition of a fourth Vice President for Planning, Quality Assurance, Global Affairs and Resource Generation, along with other new offices established in line with the implementation of NBS 589 s. 2022—Revised Organizational and Staffing Standards for SUCs—Phase 1.




Figure 1. DOrSU Campus (Main) Map, 2024




Figure 1. Main Campus (Marfori) Development Map






Figure 3. San Isidro Campus Map, 2024

Map 4b. Banaybanay Campus (San Vicente) Development Map




Figure 5. Baganga Campus Development Map




Figure 4. DOrSU Organizational Structure




Figure 4. DOrSU Organizational Structure




Figure 4. DOrSU Organizational Structure




Figure 4. DOrSU Organizational Structure




Figure 4. DOrSU Organizational Structure




Figure 4. DOrSU Organizational Structure

The **Higher Education Program** achieved 126.07%, excelling in licensure exam pass rates (139.58%) and graduate employment (101.47%). The **Advanced Education Program** reached 166.67%, with 200% performance in research-engaged faculty and accredited graduate programs. The **Research Program** achieved 107.08%, with 120% of outputs utilized by industry. The **Technical Advisory Extension Program** excelled at 215.55%, highlighted by 431.60% training participation, 220% extension programs, and 110.59% beneficiary satisfaction. These results reflect exceptional commitment to institutional goals of the University.




Figure 5. Accreditation status of all Baccalaureate programs, 2024

All accreditable programs of the University were accredited and majority of these are accredited into level 2 and 3 followed by level 1 (Figure 5). Furthermore, the SUC leveling was determined after the evaluation in 2016 under CHED Memorandum Order No. 12 series of 2018 re: "2016 SUC Levelling Results, SUC Levelling Benefits and SUC Levelling Appeal Procedures", the College maintain its SUC Level III status as a State College.

### C. GRADUATE TRENDS




Figure 6. Number of graduates for the past five years

The graduates' trend shows a sharp drop in 2020-2021 (1,353 graduates) due to the COVID-19 pandemic, followed by a recovery in 2021-2022 (2,094 graduates). However, numbers declined again in 2022-2023 (1,783) and 2023-2024 (1,434), highlighting the pandemic's lingering effects and the need for strategies to boost graduation rates (Figure 6).




Figure 7. The completion rate of students who enrolled four years ago in their degree program.




Figure 8. Distribution of Baccalaureate graduates as to their home town.

### D. PERFORMANCE IN PROFESSIONAL LICENSURE EXAMINATIONS, 2024

The University produced 853 new licensed professionals in various fields of professions (Table 4). Most of these were teachers, followed by criminologists. The result showed that DOrSU is consistently above the national passing mark except for the civil engineers and agriculturists.




Figure 9. Five-year trend of graduates passing the licensure examination

The passing rates of DOrSU graduates in the licensure examinations this year is on upswing compared to 2017 (Figure 9) except for the agriculture trend.

In 2024, Davao Oriental State University (DOrSU) achieved medium-sized university status with 17,257 enrolled students, reflecting its significant growth and impact. This milestone was driven by the expansion of relevant academic programs in fields like technology, agriculture, and health sciences; improved facilities, including new campuses; enhanced student support through scholarships and career services; modernized teaching methods with technology integration; and strengthened partnerships with industries and communities. As DOrSU grows, it faces opportunities to boost research and regional development but must address challenges like sustaining education quality, balancing resources, and maintaining inclusivity. This progress underscores DOrSU's dedication to accessible, quality education while supporting regional advancement.

#### F. PROFILE OF TEACHING STAFF




Figure 11. Tenure of employment of members of the faculty, 2024

During the year, 35% of the teaching staff were part-time (Figure 11), with most carrying a full-time teaching load. Faculty members from DepEd and other government agencies primarily served in the evening programs. The University employed 346 full-time faculty members, 46.82% of whom held advanced degrees in their respective fields of specialization. Most of the full-time faculty were on permanent tenure and relatively young, with 88% under the age of 50.




Figure 12. Highest academic degree earned by full-time members of the faculty, 2024




Figure 13. Age Distribution of full-time members of the faculty, 2024

### G. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE, SCHOLARSHIP AND STUDENTSHIP

For the first semester of this academic year, a total of 9,601 students have availed of the various scholarships and grants of the college. Of this number, 90 students are internally-funded while the 9,511 students are externally funded. Among the externally-funded grants, CHED has the highest number of grantees.





#### H. OFFICE OF THE STUDENT COUNSELING AND DEVELOPMENT

The Office of the Student Counseling and Development is currently offering its Counseling services which can be availed all-year round through referral and walk-in. Thus, these are the number of students who had availed the counseling services throughout the year per Institute. There were 18 students who availed the service from the Faculty of Agriculture and Life Sciences (FALS); 17 students from the Faculty of Computing, Engineering, and Technology (FACET). In addition, 8 students availed the service from the Faculty of Business and Management (FBM), 10 students from the Faculty of Teacher Education (FTED); 4 students from Faculty of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences (FNAHS); and 1 student from the Faculty of Humanities, Social Sciences, and Communication (FHUSOCOM).

Overall, there were 62 who availed the Office of Student Counseling and Development's services throughout the year 2024. Thus, these are the numbers of students who have availed the counseling services by case/concern: Academic Related - 25 cases; Behavioral - 23 cases; Personal Matters - 13 cases; Psychological - 1 case; Substance Abuse - 2 cases; and Health Related - 1 case.

#### **PLACEMENT SERVICES**

#### MENTAL HEALTH WEEK CELEBRATION

World Mental Health Month is celebrated annually in October. To mark this occasion, the office organized a week-long activity in collaboration with HRDS and OSA, involving participating organizations such as the University Peer Facilitators, University Student Council, and Association of Special Needs Educators. The office also invited the Psychology program to join in the celebration. The event attracted 781 participants from various faculties of the university.

The Mental Health Awareness Week, held from October 7 to October 10, aimed to educate and engage the university community in mental health practices. The activities included informational sessions on mental hygiene, emotional expression booths, and resources to promote mental well-being among students, staff, and faculty.

To conclude the week-long celebration of World Mental Health Day, Dr. Henzel Embalzado, a faculty member at Ateneo de Davao University, delivered a keynote speech focused on strategies for promoting and prioritizing mental well-being. The morning session targeted students from the psychology program, as well as second-year and third-year students in the nursing and special needs education programs. The afternoon session catered to newly hired faculty and staff, addressing the unique mental health challenges they may face. Both sessions provided valuable resources and strategies for maintaining well-being in the academic setting.

In summary, World Mental Health Week effectively engaged a diverse array of individuals within the academic community. The activities offered practical methods for enhancing mental well-being and facilitated discussions on mental health issues by creating friendly and safe spaces. The collaboration among various departments and student organizations further underscored the importance of a unified approach to mental health in the academic environment.

#### ANTI-ILLEGAL DRUGS AND HIV/AIDS AWARENESS PROGRAM

The Anti-Illegal Drug and HIV/AIDS Symposium is a vital event aimed at raising awareness and addressing the urgent public health issues of substance abuse and HIV/AIDS. The symposium was held in two parts, focusing on different audiences to maximize its reach and impact.

In the morning, the event took place at the Gymnasium for Students at 8:00 AM, where students gathered for an informative and engaging session. This segment centered on educating young people about the risks of illegal drug use and its direct connection to the spread of HIV/AIDS. Experts in public health and addiction treatment delivered presentations on the dangers of drug use, how it contributes to high-risk behaviors such as sharing needles and unprotected sexual intercourse, and the importance of harm reduction strategies. The session also included interactive discussions, allowing students to ask questions and gain a deeper understanding of how to protect themselves and their communities from both drug abuse and HIV transmission. A free HIV test was also offered to participating students during the symposium. The event had 423 participants from different faculties and newly hired staff at the university.

In the afternoon, the focus shifted to newly hired faculty and staff in the AB Conference Room at 1:30 PM. This segment was tailored specifically for educators and staff to equip them with the knowledge and resources to support students and colleagues affected by drug abuse or HIV/AIDS. They were introduced to practical tools for recognizing signs of substance abuse or HIV-related issues in students and offered guidance on how to respond appropriately. Presentations on developing supportive classroom environments, addressing stigma, and integrating discussions of HIV/AIDS and addiction prevention into their curricula were also featured. The session emphasized the role of educators in promoting awareness, supporting at-risk individuals, and fostering a healthy and inclusive campus culture.

Both segments of the symposium served as platforms for open dialogue, shared learning, and collaboration, leaving participants better equipped to contribute to the ongoing fight against the twin challenges of illegal drug use and HIV/AIDS.

#### STUDENT PEER FACILITATOR TRAINING

The University Peer Facilitators (UPF), formerly known as the "CARE Group," have been a vital support for the Office of Student Counseling and Development (OSCD) over the years. They play a crucial role in assisting the unit with the implementation of programs for students throughout the year. To further enhance their skills and help them become more effective facilitators, the OSCD unit annually conducts Basic Peer Facilitators Training for both returning and newly recruited peer facilitators. This year, the 2-day training took place on September 13-14, 2024, at the DOrSU Main Campus – OSCD Testing Room, with 30 participants.

The training aims to equip participants with the skills necessary to become more effective and efficient peer facilitators. It covers seminar topics that contribute to their personal development, such as self -awareness, understanding boundaries, effective communication, and basic mental health first aid. Additionally, topics on facilitation skills and time management are included to provide comprehensive training for the peer facilitators. To foster a sense of camaraderie among participants, a team-building activity was conducted during the latter part of the training, allowing them to showcase their teamwork. Overall, the training was deemed timely and relevant for both returning and newly recruited members of the University Peer Facilitators.

#### I. OFFICE OF HEALTH AND WELLNESS SERVICES

The Health Services Unit is a division of the Office of Student Services Division that provides health services to DOrSU constituents through the Clinic-Out-Patient setting and referral system as needed. Consultation, treatment of health-related issues, and referrals are all part of this.

In 2024, the Health Services Clinic provided a total of 24,656 medical services and procedures across four quarters. These services included consultation with medication, blood pressure taking, random blood sugar (RBS) monitoring, wound dressing, issuance of medical certificates, requisition of laboratory request forms, and RAT testing for symptomatic patients. The highest number of services was recorded in the third quarter, with 15,699 procedures rendered, indicating an increased demand for medical assistance during this period.

In terms of dental services, the clinic rendered a total of 408 procedures throughout the year, which encompassed consultation with medication, tooth extractions, and oral scaling. The fourth quarter saw the highest number of dental services provided, with 175 procedures performed, potentially reflecting heightened patient awareness of dental health or a seasonal increase in dental health needs.

#### J. OFFICE OF STUDENT PROMOTION, ADMISSION AND TESTING

#### **Admission and Enrollment**

The Office of Student Promotion, Admission, and Testing successfully conducted the Admission and Enrollment process for incoming students, transferees, and graduate school enrollees for the second semester of the academic year 2023-2024. This process, which took place from January 8 to January 26, 2024, was a collaborative effort involving various stakeholders and modern technologies to ensure efficiency and inclusivity. With the assistance of student volunteers from the Codebyters-Student Organization, the enrollment campaign was extremely successful. These volunteers played vital roles in assisting incoming first-year students, transferees, returnees, and graduate school applicants throughout the enrollment period.

Modernization and technology were integrated into the enrollment procedures, streamlining activities, and simplifying navigation for both facilitators and participants. Comprehensive training was provided to student volunteers, empowering them to handle responsibilities such as encoding information in the eSMS system, organizing files, and addressing client queries.

A total of ten thousand one hundred thirty-eight (10,138) students were successfully enrolled or catered to in the main campus in various programs, showcasing the effectiveness and adaptability of the process. The use of eSMS played a pivotal role in managing student information and contributing to overall efficiency. Students' data were appropriately encoded in the eSMS, and the documents were systematically filed. Complete and accurate student documents were also forwarded to the Registrar's Office.

The collaborative efforts of the Office of Student Promotion, Admission, and Testing (OSPAT) personnel, student volunteers, and supporting staff ensured a smooth execution of the enrollment process, highlighting effective teamwork and dedication to addressing client needs. Additionally, queries and concerns were promptly addressed through various communication channels such as phone calls, texts, messages, and emails. Overall, the successful enrollment campaign reflects our commitment to providing quality service and meeting the diverse needs of our student population in the new normal.

For proper endorsement, the Division Superintendents' endorsement was sought before the conduct of the said activity. The different school heads warmly accommodated the OSPAT Team and gathered their students for a 45-minute talk. The talk provided a clear understanding of DOrSU's programs and their alignment with the students' aspirations.

The promotional campaign has produced promising outcomes, with significant student engagement and interest observed. Students showed their interest and enthusiasm by raising various questions during the talk, clarifying the admission process. Additionally, posters were strategically distributed across campuses to enhance visibility and awareness among graduating students. Overall, the campaign was successfully conducted. The Office of Student Affairs (OSA) is responsible on releasing good moral certification, signing of student clearance, recognition and monitoring of student organizations, fraternities, and cultural groups and other related affairs or concerns of students. It is also responsible in reviewing and approving all student activities and keeping records on matters pertaining to student disciplinary actions.

The university recognized student organizations submit their accomplishment report/terminal report as their concluding requirements and for clearance purposes. The office also handles cases of reported complaints on student behaviors. These cases were just light offenses. #### L. PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT STUDENT OFFICE (PESO)

The Pre-Employment Seminar Workshop is an annually coordinated activity of GCTC to PESO aiming to quip participants with enough knowledge, skills, information and proper ethics in becoming competitive in the employment world. A representative from SSS, PHILHEALTH and Pag-IBIG fund was also invited to give an orientation of their respective mandatory deductions and its corresponding benefits. Anti-illegal recruitment campaign is one of the advocacies of the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), was integrated in the program, to give awareness on the different illegal recruitment activities especially to those considering working abroad. This activity was designed for and participated by the graduating students of the respective campuses.

For the past 3 years, Monde Nissin Corporation has been conducting recruitment activity exclusively for the BITM graduating students of DOSCST. This year, there were 35 students who registered and undergone the recruitment process like examinations and interview. Out of the 35, 21 of them passed the examinations and job interview. The applicants were given list of medical requirements for further screening. This was conducted last June 8, 2018.

#### M. COLLEGE LIBRARY

The Library report 2018 offers reviews of the activities and accomplishments actively supported by the library management and staff. Bigger portion of these activities are institutional in nature such as; ISO and ISA compliance, RQuAT and CHED requirements, Accreditation tasks, PRIME-HRM and other undertakings. The library at one hand focuses on how to cope with the book and journal collection gap noting the cost of resources versus the budget allotment per program.

The College Library enjoined the 84th National Book week & Library and Information Service Month 2018 with the theme "Connected Actions, Collective Vision: Libraries Transforming `Society". Advocating the value of books and libraries, the DOSCST library initiated activities to spread and showcase its relevance to the reading public. On November 13, 2018, a training entitled ""Essentials in managing libraries, the technical and reader's services" was conducted in celebration of the Library and Information Service Month. This is a joint activity between DOSCST and DepEd as per MOA signed in 2017. There were two activities undertaken. First was the training and then the benchmarking of designated teacher-librarians in the college library. There were 33 teachers who attended representing schools both from the elementary and high school levels of Mati North District. The training program was successfully conducted however one speaker in the person of Ms. Catherine G. Caballero was not around since she was sick. Her slot was being presented by Dr.

Dr. Garry L. Bastida in addition to his prepared topic. Earlier than planned, the activity ended with a closing program and the awarding of certificate of participation and appearance to all attendees. The giving of brochures, leaflets and stickers about ASEAN to all participants was also done. For the benchmarking, attendees were able to view the DOST STARBOOKS being stationed at the eLibrary. 


Figure 14. Utilization data per Library section, 2018




Figure 15. Door count statistics per Library section, 2018




Figure 16. Circulation statistics per patron type, 2018



The Training on Journal and Publication System, held on February 5-6, 2024, equipped researchers with essential knowledge about the journal submission process. Participants learned about manuscript formatting, compliance with journal guidelines, and ethical considerations. This training laid the foundation for publishing effectively by improving clarity, coherence, and overall quality, increasing the likelihood of acceptance.

The 2024 Research Colloquium, with the theme "Unlocking Scholarly Insights: How AI Enhances Literature Reviews," took place on April 22, 2024. Organized by the Research, Innovation, and Extension Office, it was conducted via Zoom and brought together researchers, scholars, and practitioners to discuss trends, share insights, and foster collaborations.

On June 4, 2024, the Graduate School Office, in collaboration with the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and the University Research Office, hosted a Research Publication workshop at the Graduate School Library. Dr. Edison Roi D. Macusi presented on writing impactful research, data visualization, journal processes, and the peer-review system. The workshop successfully inspired participants to enhance their publication skills.

The 2024 University Annual Scientific Review, Innovation, and Extension Summit, held on August 1-2, 2024, show-casing the latest scientific studies, groundbreaking innovations, and impactful extension programs, marking a significant milestone in the university's research calendar.

The 37th SMAARRDEC Regional Symposium on Research, Development, and Extension was held on August 13-14, 2024, at the Davao del Norte State College Gymnasium in Panabo City. The event, themed "Navigating a Sustainable Future: Empowering Research, Development, and Innovation for AANR," ran alongside the Farmers and Fisherfolk Forum, offering insights into sustainable agricultural practices.

From October 9 to 10, 2024, the Davao Research Journal (DRJ) collaborated with faculty from the Cateel Extension Campus to conduct the training workshop "Creating Impactful Research: A Training-Workshop on Scientific Journal Publication" at the Cateel Extension Campus. The workshop covered manuscript formatting, adherence to journal guidelines, and the submission process to improve participants' success in publishing.

The 2nd International Biodiversity Conference (IBC) 2024 took place from October 24 to 26 in Mati City, Davao Oriental. Hosted by Davao Oriental State University (DOrSU), the event attracted scientists, academics, community leaders, environmental advocates, and students worldwide. With the theme "Sustainable Management in Agriculture, Regenerative Technology, and Ecosystem Restoration (SMARTER)," the conference featured plenary sessions, research presentations, policy brief discussions, and networking opportunities.

On December 3-4, 2024, the DOrSU Research, Innovation, and Extension (RIE) division conducted its annual strategic planning and team-building activity at Eden Nature Park and Resort in Davao City. The event gathered 49 participants to align RIE's strategies with the university's goals. Activities included a strategy review, a SWOT analysis, and the establishment of key performance indicators.

Finally, on December 10, 2024, the Research Colloquium for Extension Campuses was held, led by the Director for Research. The event consolidated research proposals from faculty across extension campuses, preparing them for potential funding in Fiscal Year 2025. It provided a platform for faculty members to showcase their studies and promote collaborative research efforts.






Figure Tenure of employment of non – teaching Personnel, 2024




Figure Age distribution of non-teaching personnel, 2024

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



Attendance to the Commission on Higher Education in coordination with the European Commission, will be holding its Erasmus+ Information Session on February 15, 2024 via zoom.


